

# BOLO Be On the

Andropogon bicornis

(Barbas de Indio)

Your kokua is needed to prevent its spread and protect people and our native species.



# Facts:

- Ranked as a high fire risk by Hawai'i land managers
- · Large bunch grass that accumulates dry leaves, posing a fire hazard
- Grows in thickets that can burn well even at high humidity
- · Increases in abundance after a fire making it difficult to eradicate
- Grows along roadsides, commonly invading disturbed areas, pastures and dry shrublands

## Distribution:

- Widespread on Kaua'i in Kōke'e State Park in the Awa'awapuhi Valley, the end of Awa'awapuhi Trail and at the lookout
- · Detected on Hawai'i Island in 2003
- Seen in Hilo. Hawai'i Island in 2020

### Identification:

- White, feathery spikelets are found on reddish flowering culms that look like small upright brooms
- **Grows in large flowering culms** with narrow grass blades, less than a 1/4 inch wide
- · Can grow up to 8 feet tall
- Can be confused with 3 other species: Andopogon glomeratus,
   Andopogon virginicus and Schizachryium scoparium
- Successful identification requires mature, complete specimens so reporting possible sightings is the most important thing to do

# How You Can Help:



- · Stay on marked trails
- Wash gear and boots before and after visiting at risk areas; this will help prevent the spread of seeds
- Report any sightings outside of Kaua'i to the 643-Pest app so Andropogon bicornis can be identified and removed
- Note where you found it and take photos if possible
- Do not attempt to pull it out, only report sightings
