Weather & Climate Outlook

Currently 90% of Hawai'i is abnormally dry after excessive rainfall events in January and February. The four-month weather outlook calls for near to above normal temperatures and near to above normal precipitation. La Niña will continue to weaken during the next couple months with a transition to ENSO neutral likely by April. The weakening La Niña will also likely allow stronger MJO events, thus providing better chances for more organized precipitation events across the islands. Enhanced trade winds are likely to occur during the next couple of months as La Niña weakens but is not expected to align with critically dry fuels.
